What happens to the Stuff that is put into those Rumpke Bins and Drop Boxes for Recycling????



At Rumpke's Material Recovery Facility in Dayton, commingled recyclables from Darke County go up the conveyor belt to be sorted

- 1. Consumer Products contained in steel cans, aluminum cans, glass jars and jugs, or plastic pet and HDPE bottles are purchased.
- 2. Once the products inside the containers are used, the empty containers are commingled (mixed together) and are placed in a bin at curbside or are taken to a drop box, where they are collected for recycling.
- 3. A 25-cubic yard converted garbage truck that compacts the recyclable containers, just like garbage is compacted, picks ups the containers from the bins.
- 4. The truck or roll off takes the recyclable containers to Rumpke Transfer Station, where the containers are transferred to a 100-cubic yard truck.
- 5. The truck transports the containers to the Rumpke Material Recovery Facility in Dayton.
- 6. At the facility, the containers are dumped at the bottom of a conveyor belt.
- 7. Once on the conveyor belt, they are automatically sorted at the rate of 15 tons per hour.
- 8. Once sorted, the materials are either baled and loaded into semi-trailers or loaded loose into large containers for shipment to mills or secondary processing facilities.
- 9. At the processing plant, they are shredded, re-pelletized, or melted down into materials that can be used in the manufacturing process.
- 10. The processed materials are transported to a manufacturing plant.
- 11. At the manufacturing plant, the materials are made into new products for retail.



`fter the commingled recyclables have been sorted, they are cored in large bins until they can be transported to a processing plant, where they will be repelletized, shredded, or melted down into a form that can be used in the manufacturing process to make recycled products.



Shopping Bags

A reusable shopping bag, sometimes called bag for life is a type of shopping bag which can be reused several times: this is an alternative of single use paper or plastic bags. It is often made from fabric such as canvas, woven synthetic fibers, or a thick plastic that is more durable than disposable plastic bags, allowing multiple uses.

First introduced in the US in 1977, plastic shopping bags for bagging groceries at stores flourished in the 1980s and 1990s, replacing paper bags. In 1990s, governments in some countries started to impose taxes on distribution of disposable plastic bags or to regulate the use of them. Supermarkets increasingly discourage consumers from using disposable plastic bags and offer alternative reusable shopping bags with small prices, providing information on environmental damage associated with plastic bag. Because of these encouragements, reusable shopping bags are gradually taking place beside plastic bags. The shape of reusable shopping bags which are now becoming popular is usually different from what they used to be before the prevalence of plastic bags. The apparel industry promotes reusable shopping bags as sustainable fashion.


Thank you for recycling!

Acceptable items include:

- · Plastic bottles and jugs
- Aluminum and metal cans.
- · Cereal and snack boxes
- Cardboard, (flattened to 2' x 3')
- · Newspaper with inserts
- Junk mail and phone books
- Empty aerosol cans (tips removed)
- * You do NOT have to remove labels.

- Glass jars and bottles
- Magazines and catalogs
- Office and computer paper
- Cartons (juice, milk and egg substitute containers)
- Clean pizza boxes (free of food and grease)





Please do not put these in your Rumpke Recycling bin:

- · Garbage
- · Food or yard waste
- Plastic bags
- Syringes*
- Electronics

- Buckets
- · Butter tubs
- · Light bulbs
- · Drinking glass
- · Batteries

- · Ceramics or dishes
- · Pots or pans
- · Foil juice pouches
- · Toys or clothing



^{*}Do not place syringes or medical waste inside of recyclables. For example, plastic containers being used to dispose of sharps should be placed with garbage only and are not recyclable. They may place employees who are sorting the material at risk of serious injury.

What happens to your Recycables?

Your red Rumpke recycling bin should be placed at the curb the night before your scheduled pick-up.

Recyclables are picked up by a specially designed truck separate from the traditional garbage vehicle. The Rumpke recycling employee initially separates newspapers and brown grocery bags from other "commingled" material (glass, aluminum cans, plastics, etc.). Newspapers and brown grocery bags are kept in a separate compartment of the recycling truck to keep them separate from other commingled material.

At the end of the route, each recycling truck is weighed and unloaded for sorting at Rumpke's recycling facility located in Dayton.

At the state-of-the-art recycling center, automated and manual separation processes are employed to sort materials into appropriate categories. Once separated, materials are then baled or containerized for shipping to various mills and reprocessing facilities where the recyclables are used to make new items.

Should an unacceptable item be placed in your recycling bin, your Rumpke recycling driver will place a sticker on it and leave it in your bin indicating the item is not being accepted at this time.

Why these items are not accepted.....

Plastic Caps

Currently, limited markets exist for these types of plastic. Rumpke is constantly researching and evaluating potential markets.

Butter or Cool Whip Bowls

Although they are marked #2 plastic, these containers have a chemical additive to strengthen the rim. The additive makes them act negatively in the recycling process.

Window & Drinking Glass or Light Bulbs

These types of glass are chemically different. Some even contain lead. Therefore, they are contaminants.

Coat Hangers and Steel Scrap

Rumpke does recycle these materials for industrial accounts. Due to the relatively small volume generated by residential recycling, these are not accepted in the curbside or drop-box program. (If you have a large quantity of this material, try contacting a local scrap dealer.)

Fiction: It isn't necessary to recycle to "save trees" because we are growing as many as we cut.

Fact: We are growing trees in a process called clear cutting. This means all the foliage is burned and cleared away from the areas surrounding the trees. As a result, each generation of trees becomes weaker because they lack valuable nutrients from the foliage and other organic matter that decays and absorbs into the soil, nourishing trees (Nature's Recycling). Many of these trees are cut before they can grow to maturity. Just ask a carpenter how difficult it is to obtain quality lumber these days.

Paper

Over 40% of the waste that goes into a landfill is paper, amounting to 72.6 million tons per year in America alone. Contrary to popular belief, paper does not biodegrade quickly in a landfill. In fact, newspapers have been found that could still be read forty years after disosal. When you consider that Americans cut down 830 million trees per year for paper products alone, it is easy to see the importance of recycling as much paper as we possibly can. One ton of paper recycled save 3.5 cubic yards of landfill space, 17 trees, 7,000 gallons of water, 380 gallons of oil, 4100 kw hours of electricity, 60 lbs. of air pollution, and 850 lbs. of CO2 per year.

Fluorescent Lights

Mercury accumulates in human and animal tissue and in the environment. If released into the environment, mercury can become transformed into more toxic forms and can concentrate in food chains, where humans can be exposed through eating mercury-contaminated food. Mercury ingested by humans can cause brain damage, disabilities, birth defects, and in extreme cases, death.

Tires

A regular automobile is made from five gallons of oil. By recycling, you can reduce reliance on foreign oil.

Steel

Steel has long been one of our most recycled materirls. Just about all steel containers made contain recyed steel. Americans are currently recycling 55% of all steel that is produced.

Aluminum Cans

Recycling aluminum cans prevents the pollution that occurs from mining bauxite, the ore from which aluminum is extracted. Twenty aluminum cans can be made with the energy needed to produce one can of virgin ore. Throwing away "one" aluminum can wastes as much energy as filling the can half full of gasoline and pouring it out.

Used Motor Oil

It takes 42 gallon of high-quality crude oil to produce 2* quarts of motor oil. It takes one gallon of waste oil to produce the same amount.

Statistics show that during a month's time, two tons of motor oil will be poured into area drains. When you consider that only one quart of oil can pollute 250,000 gallons of water, this is a serious problem.

Used Car Batteries

Although batteries represent less than one percent by weight of municipal solid waste, they account for 52% of all cadmium and 88% of all mercury found in the solid waste stream. As a result, used car batteries, if not recycled or disposed of properly, can cause serious problems for the environment and human health.

Plastic

All plastic is made from petroleum. When you throw away plastic, you also throw away petroleum that was used to produce it, which is renewable natural resource. By recycling plastic, you can reduce America's reliance on foreign oil. Bio-plastics are now being produced which substitute oil from organic waste in place of petroleum.

<u>Glass</u>

Glass can be recycled again and again with no loss of quality in the new containers made from recycled glass. And, every ton of glass that is recycled saves the equivalent of nine gallons of fuel oil. This also reduces America's reliance on foreign oil.

Products Made From Recycled Materials

Instead of being buried or burned, waste materials are being recycled into attractive, strong, and durable products. When manufactured and marketed, these products are putting thousands of people to work. Recycled from milk jugs, pop cans, food cans, automobile tires, and glass bottles, these products make up ball fields, play structures, park equipment, walkways, roadways, railways, roofing, and much more. They are changing the way Americans think about recycling materials.
